MUN/MEP

Vi har et stort hold af elever på Nørre G, som deltager i gruppen MUN (Model United Nations), som hver uge mødes og debatterer og træner debatteknikker. I skoleåret 2012-2013 havde gruppen 2 elever med til MEP (Model European Parlament) i Leipzig, hvor de har deltaget i en række politiske diskussioner med andre unge fra EU-landene, ligesom flere elever fra gruppen har deltaget i 2 MUN-konferencer her i Danmark.

Bilag 1: MEP

Leipzig i det gamle Østtyskland er en moderne storby af selvmodsigelse. Byen har Tysklands største Banegård (24 spor og 3 etager!), Tysklands stejleste kirketag og adskillige arkitektoniske seværdigheder. Det er byen, hvor adskillige store musikere har levet og komponeret, særligt Johan Sebastian Bach, der står og skuer ud over befolkningen foran Thomaskirche, klar til at give en ringende lussing til alle dem, der ikke synger rent.

Sammen med de "gamle" elementer er der strøet diverse barer ud over nattelandskabet, og ikke langt fra Alte Rathaus og andre "alte" bygninger ligger en kæmpe kirke-lignende bygning i glas. Sporvogne kører overalt i denne by, jeg selv kunne ikke helt undgå at have nære konfrontationer med indtil flere.

Det var i denne hektiske by at Model European Parliament Leipzig blev afholdt. Flere end 100 delegerede fra 8 forskellige lande blev indkvarteret på et Hostel nær ved Leipzig Hauptbahnhof, og så var der lagt op til en uge, hvor fremtidens ledere kunne drøfte eller løse aktuelle emner, men også en uge med nye venskaber, sprog og en international følelse, man sjældent mærker andre steder.

For en ting, der blev gjort helt klart under konferencen var, at vi var fremtidens ledere. Vores engagement og interesse for verden omkring os skulle bære os langt og give os uendelige muligheder. Men hvad vigtigere var, som Formand Dan Gustafsson også nævnte i sin åbningstale, var at vi ved at deltage i en begivenhed som denne gjorde os selv internationale, og ikke mindst europæiske. Og dette, i en globaliseret verden, hvor det ofte er nødvendigt at finde et fælles sprog. Noget, der rækker meget længere end engelsk, tysk, fransk eller spansk.

Fandt vi så dette europæiske sprog? Den danske delegation på 11 elever fra Gefion, Rysensteen, Ringsted, Svendborg og Nørre blev fordelt over 5 forskellige komitéer, der alle drøftede aktuelle og relevante EU-problematikker.

I komitéen var dresscode skjorte, blazer, nypudsede sko og slips, man lyttede opmærksomt, man rakte landekortet op, man talte kun under godkendelse af komitépræsidenten og alt, hvad man sagde, skulle startes med "Thank you, Madame/Mr. President".

Ikke nok med, at disse komitéer skulle arbejde sammen for at løse problemet, skulle vi også selv finde emner, som vi mente, var relevante og løselige.

Mange vil sige, at EU er en bureaukratisk union. Efter de 10 timers komitéarbejde, der var indlagt i programmet, kan jeg sige, at jeg til dels forstår, hvorfor dette bureaukrati finder sted. Selv i en komité på blot 10 mennesker var meningerne vidt forskellige, og alle ville gerne have et ord med. Vi vidste alle, at selve ånden i Model European Parliament lægger op til, ligesom i det virkelige EU, at man skal blive enige om en fælles løsning, for sammen at stå stærkere. Kompromiser blev indgået af mange parter, men samtidig var der også plads til at man kunne slappe af og grine lidt, fx når Catalonien blev brugt som eksempel... for 100.000 gang.

Alt i alt var Leipzig den rigtige værtsby til MEP. Det, at byen består af så mange, selvmodsigende elementer er, for mig, blot en refleksion af den gruppe mennesker, der besøgte den. Vi har også alle vores forskellige meninger. Nogen kan bedst lide gotisk arkitektur, andre victoriansk, men sammen formår vi at fremstå som en forenet styrke. Præcis ligesom Leipzig fremstår som en moderne storby, i modsætning til 30 små provinser. Det er hvad jeg må konkludere, er den europæiske ånd. At man, på trods af forskellige holdninger, meninger og historie, sammen kan blive enige om, på fredelig vis, at én stor stemme er bedre en 27 små. Det kan vi være stolte af, både i form af de fire resolutioner, der er kommet ud af de 10 timers arbejde, men også som potentielle fremtidige ledere. Den europæiske fællesnævner og ånden bag den er det vigtigste, jeg har taget med mig fra MEP Leipzig 2012.
